Swaledale & Arkengarthdale

The two far northern dales, with their iconic farming landscape of field barns and drystone walls, are the perfect place to retreat from a busy world and relax.

At the head of Swaledale is the tiny village of Keld - you can explore its history at the Keld Countryside & Heritage Centre. This is the crossing point of the Coast to Coast Walk and the Pennine Way long distance footpaths, and one end of the newest cycle route, the Swale Trail (read more about this on page 10). The River Swale is one of England's fastest rising spate rivers, rushing its way between Thwaite, Muker, Reeth and Richmond.

On the moors you're likely to see the hardy Swaledale sheep, key to the livelihood of many Dales farmers - and the logo for the Yorkshire Dales National Park; in the valleys, tranquil hay meadows, at their best in the early summer months.

It is hard to believe these calm pastures and wild moors were ever a site for





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industry, but in many places you will see the dramatic remains of the former leadmining industry. Find out more about local life at the Swaledale Museum in Reeth.

Also in Reeth are great shops showcasing local photography and arts and crafts: stunning images at Scenic View Gallery and dramatic sculptures at Graculus, as well as exciting new artists cooperative, Fleece.

Further up the valley in Muker is cosy Swaledale Woollens and the Old School Gallery.

If you want to get active, why not learn navigation with one of the companies in the area that offer training courses or take to the hills on two wheels with Dales Bike Centre.

And after all the exercise, there are some great cafés and pubs to enjoy. Have a drink at Tan Hill - the highest pub in Great Britain - or a meal at the CB Inn or The Burgoyne Hotel.

Further down the Swale lies the market town of Richmond with its castle ramparts rising above the river and a stunning market square. The old station has been converted into a great place to visit with cinema, art galleries and a brewery that can be toured.

Malham Landscape Trail

This classic walk takes in three of Malham's most popular and intriguing features: the magical glade of Janet's Foss waterfall, where, according to legend, Janet, Queen of the Faeries, made her home; the steep-sided gorge of Gordale Scar, reputedly the inspiration for Helms Deep in Tolkien's Lord of the Rings; and, finally, Malham Cove, an extraordinary 70 metre high natural limestone amphitheatre, topped by a lunar landscape of limestone pavement reached by 400 stone steps.

Distance: 3.9 miles (6.3km)

Time: 1½ hours minimum

Parking and toilets: Malham National Park Centre BD23 4DA (SD 90016 62628)

Route description

1. Turn left out of the car park and head into the village, looking out for Malham Smithy on your right. As you approach the Smithy, turn right onto an old stone clapper bridge. On the far side, turn right onto the Pennine Way. Follow it until you reach two wooden kissing gates.



2. Turn left through the gates and follow the stone flagged path all the way through open fields. Pass through a gate into woodland. In spring and summer carpets of bluebells and wild garlic can be seen in and amongst the ash, birch and hazel trees. The path weaves its way up to Janet's Foss - the old Norse word for waterfall or force. Follow it up past the waterfall taking care over the rocks and tree roots until you reach Gordale Road.

3. Turn right and, after a short distance, turn left onto another footpath just before


a bridge. (NB. Instead of turning off here, you could make the detour to Gordale Scar). Follow the path up through fields, pass through two narrow gates and then bear left on a stony path along a field ledge.

4. When you reach the road, turn right for a short distance, cross the road, and then go left over a stile onto a footpath across open fields. Follow this for 500 metres to a junction and wall corner where you stay left.

5. This path takes you to the top of Malham Cove - take care near the edge. Limestone rock can be extremely slippy when wet. Fine views down Malhamdale can be enjoyed from the top. Cross the top of the Cove and take the stepped path back down to the foot. Follow the level clear path back to the village.

The Malham Landscape Trail booklet, which includes the full route, information on the area's history, wildlife and geology, and what you will see on the way round, can be purchased at Malham National Park Centre.

Magnificent Malham Cove can also be reached on an easy, barrier-free walk from the village. The 2 mile round trip is suitable for pushchairs and wheelchair users. Wensleydale

The market town of Hawes lies at the head of Wensleydale and is home to the Dales Countryside Museum and the world-famous Wensleydale Creamery - the source of Wallace and Grommit's much loved cheese. There are plenty of shops and places to eat and it is a great base to head out on a walk or cycle ride.

From Hawes you can jump on the Little White Bus to Snaizeholme red squirrel trail and see these loveable creatures making a comeback in their natural habitat.

Close to the town is Hardraw Force - the highest single-drop waterfall in England. And there are many other spectacular waterfalls in the valley: Cauldron Force at



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West Burton, made famous by the artist J M W Turner, the dramatic Aysgarth Falls (pictured), and more hidden delights, such as Mill Gill at Askrigg.

The largest natural lake in the Dales, Semer Water, is much enjoyed by anglers, canoeists and sailors.

The medieval Bolton Castle is incredibly well preserved and you can wander through the rooms and admire the views from the battlements. Find out about falcons, have a go at archery or tour the gardens. Nearby Redmire is a starting point for the vintage Wensleydale Railway which offers passenger services to Leeming Bar.

The wonderful Aysgarth Edwardian Rock Garden, commissioned by local landowner Frank Sayer-Graham (1859-1946), has such a fascinating story that it is now

Grade II listed. Jervaulx Abbey, located in a beautiful, wooded setting by the River Ure, is privately owned but open to the general public and has an 'honesty box' to help towards its upkeep.

And for the big kid in everyone, head to the mysterious The Forbidden Corner to solve riddles and explore hidden passages.

In the lower dale are a string of lovely market towns. Middleham has a superb castle owned by Historic England, Masham has two famous breweries to visit - Black Sheep and Theakstons, and Leyburn's highlights include The Garden Rooms at Tennants, an arts venue and eatery.

Every year millions of dogs - local and visitors - enjoy the National Park with owner in tow, and who can blame them for taking the lead. There's great exploring to be done and many dog-friendly establishments.

But it's no walk in the park. The safety and enjoyment of every dog and its family is important when out and about.

Dogs must be kept under control at heel or better still on a lead around livestock - after all, your dog could be shot for disturbing or chasing farm animals. If

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chased, it is safer to drop the lead and get out of the field.

Many ground nesting birds are easily disturbed by inquisitive dogs and fly away leaving the nest vulnerable. From March to July use a short lead.

Poo - bag it and bin it! Toxocariasis can be passed via waste to other dogs and people, and even into the soil.

Watch out for instructional signage on gates and posts, call into a National Park Centre for more advice (dogs welcome!), and check out our website at www.yorkshiredales.org.uk/ dogs-and-the-dales

Pedal power

With the thrill of the Tour de France Grand Départ visiting the National Park in 2014 and Tour de Yorkshire passing through again in 2018, no guide to the outdoors would be complete without mentioning cycling

There is a fantastic network of quiet roads to explore - some of which are even relatively flat! However, it is taking on the area's great climbs that many cyclists come for. Buttertubs Pass, Fleet Moss and Park Rash are recognised as some of the best in the country and gave the elite riders of Le Tour a fitting test.

If you prefer to get off the road, then the network of bridleways is outstanding with a massive variety of routes to choose from. You can explore these by mountain bike or on horseback, and if you don't have one of your own then you can hire either while you are here. Our dedicated website **www.cyclethedales.org.uk** will tell you more, or go to **www. yorkshiredales.org.uk/horse-riding**.



The spectacular 2018 **Tour de Yorkshire** speeds into the National Park on its way from Halifax to Leeds on Sunday 6 May.

Be our eyes and ears...

A fantastic variety of wildlife call the National Park home, but some species are particularly at risk from illegal persecution.

Our recent consultation with residents and visitors on the area's management over the next five years highlighted that wildlife crime - especially bird of prey persecution - was a concern for many people.

Despite legal protection, birds like peregrine, hen harrier, buzzard, shorteared owl and red kite continue to be illegally killed or injured in and around the National Park. North Yorkshire is the worst county in the UK for crimes against birds of prey. Birds are killed by shooting, trapping or poisoning.

We are working closely with the police and other partners to tackle wildlife

crime, but we need your eyes and ears to help us. If you see any signs of wildlife crime, please call 101, or 999 if a crime is in progress.

Help us keep the Dales special

- Stay on rights of way through fields and meadows and reduce your impact on wildlife and agriculture.
- Use your car less and enjoy other means of getting around.
 - Stay overnight and shop locally rather than bringing food with you - this helps boost the local economy and ensures a sustainable future for those who live and work here.
 - Respect the life and work of people who live here - much of the land is privately-owned.

CRUEL AND DANGEROUS

ILLEGALLY POISONED

Animal carcases laced with poison are sometimes deliberately used to kill other wildlife, particularly birds of prey. This is cruel and illegal, and such poisoned bait is also a serious risk to the health of members of the public and their children or pets, should they come into contact with it.

If you think an animal or bird has been illegally poisoned, keep your children and animals away, make a note of your location, and ring North Yorkshire Police immediately by dialling **101**, or call the Wildlife Incident Investigation Scheme: Telephone: **0800 321 600**





Pitch in for Whernside

At 736m, Whernside is the highest peak in Yorkshire.

Part of the iconic Yorkshire Three Peaks challenge route, people have been attracted to its summit since Victorian times and today Whernside gets well over 80,000 walkers every year. But it is suffering from this popularity.

A new campaign aims to raise money for the repair of this much-loved footpath and we are asking for your support.

'Pitch in for Whernside' has been launched by the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority as part of the British Mountaineering Council's national 'Mend Our Mountains: Make One Million' fundraising campaign. Our aim is to raise $\pounds 46,000$ to 'rebuild part of the Bruntscar path, the main descent off the summit of Whernside.

The steepest section is particularly susceptible to damage and becoming increasingly eroded, undermining the local ecology. In its current condition the path is extremely difficult to use, causing people to walk off route, and creating an everwidening scar on Yorkshire's highest hillside.

With more people than ever enjoying what the wonderful Three Peaks have to offer, the paths take a great deal of skill and money to maintain. The Mend our Mountains campaign is about inspiring walkers everywhere with a positive message about the need to look after the places we care about.

Any amount is welcomed and helps us get one step closer to our target. There will also be some great crowd-funding campaigns to get involved in - help us spread the word.

The scale of the task is huge given Bruntscar's remote location and steep conditions - but we think Whernside's worth it!





Cave & fell rescue

The Cave Rescue Organisation, based here in Clapham, is believed to be the oldest in the world.

It was formed after an incident at Gingling Hole in 1934 when a potholer broke his leg. The long drawn out rescue that followed provided a serious lesson for all. The following month Settle St John Ambulance, Giggleswick School and six potholing clubs met and proposed the world's first cavers' self-help group.

The Yorkshire and Cumbria-based rescue teams are still made up of amazing, highly trained volunteers who give their time freely 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, to provide a safety net for anyone off the beaten track, above or below ground.

In an emergency, would you know how to get help?

- 1. Call 999
- 2. Ask for 'Police' and say which county you are in
- 3. Ask the Police for 'cave' or 'fell' rescue
- 4. Say where you are and give a description and grid reference
- 5. Describe the problem and answer any other questions
- Stay by a phone or where you can maintain a signal on your mobile, keeping the line clear so you can be called back.

The rescue team will call other services as required.

Kirkby Lonsdale & the Lune Valley

In the heart of the Lune Valley sits the charming historic market town of Kirkby Lonsdale. Its many old buildings, such as St. Mary's Church - often dating back many hundreds of years - are clustered around narrow cobbled streets and squares, and there is now a great range of independent shops, cafés, pubs and hotels and a regular market which add to its atmosphere.

A short walk away is Ruskin's View, a well known viewpoint over the River Lune which was painted by the renowned eighteenth century landscape artist J M W Turner.

From there you can take a stroll alongside the river to visit the spectacular span of Devil's Bridge. There is a great picnic area to enjoy by the river or you can buy a mug of tea from the famous snack wagon.


If golf is your thing, then there are two courses to play on. Kirkby Lonsdale Golf has 18 holes and offers 'stay and play' packages with unlimited golf and local overnight accommodation. Casterton Golf Club is a 9 hole course which also offers a Par 3 course ideal for beginners.

The east side of the Lune Valley rises up to the high fells of Middleton, Barbon, Leck and Casterton. This wild and exposed area hides a secret - the longest cave system in Britain. The Three Counties stretches 89km under Yorkshire, Lancashire and Cumbria with over 40 entrances (read more on page 16).

Intersecting these fells is the wonderful steep-sided valley of Barbondale which gives a picturesque route through to Dent. It also hosts the famous Barbon hill climb a course that has been testing drivers who enjoy a challenge since 1950.

Further north, the Lune gorge forms a natural pass between the Howgills and the Lake District fells which has been used by travellers for thousands of years. The Dales Way long-distance path still uses this route in its journey connecting the Yorkshire Dales and Lake Windermere.

Running through the valley is the old




railway line which once linked Clapham to Tebay. As you explore you can still see evidence of this superb piece of engineering in a number of dramatic viaducts which span the valley.

Tebay was once a bustling railway junction town and is still a convenient stopping





point with easy access, making it a good base for walkers and cyclists.



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

Malhamdale

Malhamdale is famous for its stunning limestone scenery and includes some of the best known natural wonders in the National Park. This area has inspired poets, artists and film makers - and it is not hard to see why.

A short walk along good paths from the pretty village of Malham - with its busy National Park Centre, pubs and cafés - is the soaring limestone 'amphitheatre' of Malham Cove. For the last 25 years, peregrine falcons - the world's fastest animal - have chosen to nest and raise their young here. The RSPB and Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority set up a free public viewing point each summer so that visitors can study the birds through high powered telescopes, alongside other wildlife, such as woodpeckers and little owls, that call the cove home.

The top of the cove is reached by 400 stone steps that climb up its left hand side, where a stunning landscape of limestone pavement made up of clints (blocks) and grikes (fissures) stretches before you.

Above the cove lies Malham Tarn, the highest natural lake in England. The tarn alongside the sooty marks on the cove wall - are said to have inspired Charles


Kingsley who wrote The Water Babies while staying nearby. The site is managed by the National Trust and features great walks around the lake, a boardwalk through the nature reserve and a bird hide to visit. You may be lucky enough to see one of the water voles that have been released here.

Don't miss out on walking in to the towering gorge of Gordale Scar (below left). Hemmed in by high cliffs, a waterfall emerges through a hole in the rock at its deepest point. On your way there you pass Janet's Foss, a lovely woodland waterfall and shaded pool. Janet, the Queen of the Faeries, is said to live in the cave behind the falls.

Malham village is home to the blacksmith Annabelle Bradley who designs and makes beautiful wrought ironwork. Further down the valley you can learn about charcuterie with Chris Wildman at Town End Farm Shop, which also has a café and selection of local produce for sale.

There are many events held at Malham, the two biggest being Malham Safari at the end of May and Malham Show at the end of August - both provide great days out for all the family.
